
Dori Abbott's big day is on November 11th –shhh – I hear her five 'boys' are giving her a wonderful party. Have a Happy Birthday **Dori**.

People held cardboard stars with the names of missing women. Mine said Wendy Arnold was only twenty-three when she disappeared, the same age as my son.

Czar Nicholas 11 of Russia made the decision to take full control of the
Russia army – utter disaster.

And it went on for another 3 years – ‘*When will we ever learn?*’

WEST ISLAND REFUGEE SUPPORT GROUP



On the afternoon of Sunday October 18, Kerry-Anne Kutz offered a musical concert featuring her voice students and the Lakeshore Community Choir. It was an amazing event, and over \$900 was raised to support the sponsorship of a Syrian refugee family. You may have wondered why this came about... It began with an email invitation to several members of our congregation that Sheila Laursen sent

out on September 6th which read in part

ARE YOU MOVED TO ACTION? WILL YOU HELP?

The devastation and cruelty of the “civil” war and the resulting humanitarian crisis in Syria has been horrifying people around the world for years now. This week, our attention became focussed on the terrible human cost of such warring.

The desperation of ordinary people, trying to escape a land filled with death and destruction to find peace and stability for their family has led to hundreds of thousands of people cramming onto unsafe boats, or walking, walking; walking for months along roads, railway lines through countries and through barbed wire and past hostile soldiers.

Our Lakeshore UU Congregation responded with compassion and practical support to humanitarian crises such as this in the past. The first time, back in the 50s or 60s, it was to help a Yugoslavian family settle in Montreal. Then in the 1980s, we sponsored and supported a Vietnamese family (husband, wife and baby son) for a few years until they became fully integrated and self-supporting in Montreal.

I think it is time for us to look at doing so again - this time for a Syrian family. As there are many Syrian Christian congregations ready to sponsor Christian families from Syria, I would suggest we offer to sponsor a Muslim family fleeing the violence of Syria.

OK - easy to write, hard and complicated to do. I know that too. What I am suggesting is that a group of us who are willing, interested and dedicated to work on this meet together SOON to begin exploration, discussion, research and planning on this proposal. I have discussed this with Heather Falconer, and she is supportive of beginning this process. If no one offers to help, then I will drop the idea. But if a group of us work on this together, I am sure we can bring a positive, viable plan and proposal to a special congregational meeting - hopefully for full approval.

On September 10th, 8 people met for the first time - five from LUUC, one from UCM, and two from Merging Waters (Beaurepaire and Union United churches). We shared what we had read / researched about Canada, and Quebec's responses to the Syrian refugee crisis currently making front-page news daily.

It was noted that Quebec has its own system for refugees, although it does have to follow federal practices. That might give us an opportunity to have greater contact and support in any part of an application process. Premier Philippe Couillard has become part of a group of 5 in his region who are offering to sponsor a Syrian family.

So far, we understand that it would cost about \$30,000 to sponsor a refugee family for the first year after their arrival. More research will be done on about health care coverage, length of time before permission to work is given, etc.

We know that other church congregations in our West Island region are also wishing to sponsor refugees from this crisis - so we will seek to connect with, and develop a network of groups and individuals who could share information, resources, ideas for fundraising, etc. We would like to be part of an Interfaith response to sponsor refugees.

At our second meeting on September 23rd, we were informed that Action Refugees Montreal (ARM) noted that 1/2 of all Syrians in Canada live in Montreal, so that organization is swamped (and overwhelmed) with requests to bring family members to Quebec. They don't have the funds to hire more staff to work on all these offers to sponsor, and need funding support to do so.

Concern was expressed about sending funds to a specific refugee (or family) in advance. Options for supporting refugees include lobbying the Canadian government, funding a UNHCR or other refugee camp directly, or arranging to sponsor an individual or family with refugee status.

Eleven of the 13 people present at that meeting indicated they wish to form a Refugee Sponsorship Group.

On Wednesday October 14th, Action Refugees Montreal held a Refugee Sponsorship training session. LUUC was well represented with 7 members present, along with 5 from Merging Waters, 2 from the UCM and several West Islanders among the 80+ people attending. We now have an information kit about the sponsorship process, details about application, responsibilities, etc.
