Thriving with a Chronic Illness Sébastien Jodoin

After being diagnosed with relapsing multiple sclerosis at age 33, law professor Sébastien Jodoin embarked on the greatest research project of his life. During his talk, Sébastien will share the story of his recovery, his rigorous and comprehensive approach to optimal brain health, the ways in which he has cultivated acceptance and self-care in his life and community, and the lessons that he has learned about thriving with a chronic illness.

Sébastien holds a Ph.D. in environmental studies from Yale University, an M.Phil. in international relations from the University of Cambridge, an LL.M. in international law from the London School of Economics, and B.C.L. and LL.B. from McGill University. He is an Assistant Professor in the Faculty of Law of McGill University, where he directs the Law, Governance & Society Lab. He is also a member of the McGill Centre for Human Rights and Legal Pluralism, and an Associate Member of the McGill School of Environment.

Watermelon cake: Bake a cake with chocolate chips in it. Tint the cake pink. Ice with green icing.



THE 2018 STEWARDSHIP REPORT

Last month, I confidently announced that the Treasurer would make a succinct presentation of the Financial Outlook of the Congregation after the 15 April service. Confronted by the low attendance at that service, we then decided to make the presentation later. However, given the heavy agenda planned for the 22 April service, with Board elections and potluck following the service, I took the approach of distributing a one-page colour overview in the 22 April Order of Service. For those who may have missed this handout, the rest of this article covers essentially the same material.

In Financial Year 2017-2018, our **investments** went **up** while **income** and **expenditures** went **down**.



The **major factors influencing our investment results** include a shorter reference period (to February) this year due to earlier date of presentation and slower growth in LAM investment fund 3,5% this year vs. 7% last year (BLUE bar). Note that both years had **identical withdrawal of 5000 \$ from the investment fund** (BLUE bar). A worrying trend is lower amounts at each year end in the BMO chequing account (RED bar); this could mean that in this coming year, the Board *might have to* withdraw more than the usual 5000 \$.

Our income went down to 83% of 2015-2016, largely because of declines from last year's highs: wedding fees (down 2000 \$) and choir fees (down 1000 \$) (BLUE bar); 2018 service auction raised near 1700 \$ vs. near 2900 \$ last year (in GREEN bar); no special project (youth, music) funding vs. 2100 \$ last year; and other earmarked funding this year down to 800 \$ from 2100 \$ (both in RED bar).

The **Good News** is that you responded very well to last year's Stewardship Campaign, with regular pledge income up to near 21 000 \$ vs 18 000 \$ last year (in RED bar).

Fortunately, **expenditures** are **down from last year**, **though modestly (6%)**, notably as S.E. salaries were about half of last year (in BLUE bar) and lower than budgeted religious expenses, including less conference spending, caring costs and lower payments to the Canadian Unitarian Council, a cnsequence of fewer weddings and slightly fewer members (YELLOW bar).

Our major property aquisitions were a new office computer and a wireless mike.

The Board hopes the members will sustain their contributions in **treasure**, **talent and time** to help make our community continue to flourish. To this end, pledge forms have been distributed after services at the end of April. Even if you cannot make a firm financial committee, please let us know which activities you care to contribute your energy and talents to.
