

Dori says: "The ice storm made us realize how much we are dependent on electricity for heat, light, food and communication. We found people we met so kind and

helpful. We were very grateful that it only lasted a few days. Our thoughts are with those who are suffering for such a long time in our world."

Nancy Schmidt says: We were lucky indeed. John and I had purchased a generator, a couple of years ago, that automatically kicks in when the power goes out. Thanks to that, we were able to share our home with the daughter of a dear friend, who has health challenges and was living in a cold house.

Carol Rowan writes: Last week's ice storm hit Montreal fast and furiously. On York Road in Beaconsfield our power was off for 103 hours, and throughout the Island, thousands of trees have been damaged or killed. Yesterday, the fifth day after the storm began, I walked on Mont Royal and took some photos of the damaged trees. It was a violent storm- the wind and ice wrecked havoc. Fortunately, fire fighters, Hydro Quebec employees, city workers, emergency response teams, arborists, combined their efforts to help us through.



Heather writes :As soon as it went dark on the second evening of the storm, I sat in my chair, swathed in blankets and shawls and thought: I can't work on my computer, I can't watch TV, I can't do ancient ironing, I can't boil the kettle, I can't bake a cake, or vacuum the floor, I can't even have a cup of tea — I can't do nothing! (I think that's a double negative — but I didn't care — 'cos I was cold) - so I went to bed — fully clothed. The first time I had gone that early since I

was sent to bed in disgrace as a child!

PS: I live in the same town as the Premier's mother, so we in Ste. A de B. were inconvenienced for a mere 24 hours. (Just kidding!) ~ **ed**

Gary says: We survived 3 days without power and heat and were able to heat water for coffee in the oven using candles. **Maud Bonnier** endured 2 days with no heat. Let's urge seniors" homes to buy backup generators for future emergencies.

Sheila says: Just two days before the ice storm, a new winter jacket I had ordered arrived by post. As the temperature was in the high 20s C that day, I felt rather foolish and VERY warm when I tried it on to be sure it fit. Then I put it away in my closet for the months leading up to next winter...or so I thought.

On Wednesday, the day of the storm, it was quite cool and so I baked peanut butter cookies to take on Friday to my daughter's home near Yarker, Ontario for Easter weekend. My cookies were cooling and my oven still warm when Peter Wilson phoned me to ask if he could bring his bread over to my home to bake as their power had just shut down. About 10 minutes after Peter's bread finished baking, leaving that wonderful odour in my home, then MY power shut down!

Like everyone, I went to bed fairly early that night as there was no TV, or radio and I don't read well by candlelight or flashlight. I brought out my winter blanket for my bed, and was grateful I hadn't yet changed from flannel sheets.

By Thursday morning, outside looked like a fairy land, but inside my home became colder, and colder. By 11 a.m. I was wearing my new winter jacket and my snow boots and my little solar radio informed me that this was going to last.

So, I phoned my daughter (caught her teaching a class...) and informed her that I would come a day earlier than planned. Enough was enough! And so I packed the car, and bundled myself into it wearing my winter cloths and I headed west along the 40 and the 401.

So I escaped the cold - and was greeted by a fire blazing in the wood stove of **Karn** & Darryl's home - and a hot cup of tea to enjoy. Since that region was not affected by the ice, I was able to enjoy an outdoor Easter Egg Hunt that weekend with two of my daughters and four grandchildren....how lucky was I!!

ON THE GO AND NEED TO KNOW



CALIFORNIA - Super bloom – An explosion of oranges, yellows, purples and whites has covered California's hillsides, as a rare "super bloom" burst into life in the wake of a very wet winter. Vast stretches of countryside that spend months of the year as a muted, dry brown have been transformed into a carpet of color that can be seen from space. We have heavenly blue lawns here on the West Island at this time of the year – Just Glorious.



AMSTERDAM - ingenius - This city has more bicycles than people – but, where to park all these bikes? Why under the water of course. A bike path leads to a huge, bright and cheerful underground/water parking area which connects directly to the city's metro and railway systems via six escalators. This massive construction effort houses thousands of bikes.



EDINBURGH – Stone of Scone – Stone of Destiny – this ancient stone, used by Scottish Kings since time immemorial – was stolen by the English in the late 1200s, and placed under the coronation chair in London – where all British monarchs from that time on were so crowned. But the Scots wanted their sacred stone back – so it was returned 700 years later in 1996 – with the proviso that it be used in all future coronations. Hence – the stone has travelled, under escort, from Edinburgh Castle to Westminster Abbey for King Charles 111's coronation. (NB: The Stone was stolen/liberated from the Abbey in 1950 by some eager Scottish students – caused quite a stir when I was young – but in their haste, they broke it in two.)



CHINA – returned – Ya-Ya the giant panda on loan from China to the Memphis Zoo, has been returned to China after 20 years. Ya-Ya developed a skin problem, which caused her fur to look mangy. Le-Le, Ya-Ya's companion died in February – and the Chinese accused the Zoo of mistreating the pandas. A special plane was commission for Ya-Ya's return to Beijing, where she was greeted by thousands of well wishers. ~ *ed*



FLORIDA – ugh - A huge blob of sargassum (brown seaweed) 5,000 miles long, is heading for the Florida coast. Visible from space, it has already hit the Caribbean beaches, ruining the holiday season. The mess is massive and the smell atrocious. While the seaweed itself is
