NOTES FROM THE PRESIDENT



Looking back, November has been an intense and stressful month, but also filled with joy and special moments I will long remember.

Dr. Maureen Mayhew drew 48 people to the public presentation we hosted, along with our partners, the <u>Geography Teacher's Association of Quebec</u> and <u>Summerlea United Church's</u> outreach committee. I hope that is just the beginning of other such important

and relevant partnership projects we will do together.

November also brought intense work to fill in online documentation for each of the 3 Afghan siblings that we are partnering with the <u>Unitarian Church of Montreal</u> to bring to safety in Canada. It was painstaking and agonizing work for us to proof-read each application document - more than twice. Thank goodness for Julie Golick, the Admin Secretary for UCM who had to do, and re-do, and expand, and clarify every response sent to us from the sisters and brother in Pakistan before she could press the "Send" key!

The immediate reply was most discouraging - noting that it could take up to 9 months for a case number to be submitted for each applicant - and that dashed our hopes and increased our worries about their safety in Pakistan. And then today (November 27) our hopes are soaring again! One of the siblings received his case number today from the Canadian government....and so we are hopeful the one for the two sisters will follow along soon. Once we have the case number for each one, MP Francis Scarpaleggia's assistant will begin her 'direct to Ottawa' follow up to keep their files moving along. So today was a good day!

November's Sunday services with Sandrine Tessier of G.R.A.M.E., **Gen Lussier** and Sandra Maki of Save Fairview Forest, and **Carol Rowan** on the Power of Stories drew back more LUUCers. We also greeted several newcomers who are interested in our service themes, and in learning more about UUism and LUUC. We enjoyed a potluck luncheon and two demonstrations of Tango dancing thanks to **Peter Zion** and **Mandy Brown**, whose children are in our SE program. The final Sunday of November, with a spectacular performance by the Lakeshore Community Choir, with **Kerry-Anne** as conductor and guest musicians sharing their talent almost brought the house down with loud applause. And its freewill offering raised \$500 for LUUC!

At our Special Congregational Meeting on November 19, we gratefully voted unanimous approval of **Kerry-Anne Kutz** and **Paul Sullivan** to continue as our long-serving, wise and wonderful Lay Chaplains for 2024. Also on the agenda was a wonderful proposal for the \$32,463 bequest left to our congregation in **Margaret Godbeer's** will. The funds will be put into a GIC account with our bank, and the annual interest from those funds will be divided equally between 2 bursaries;

- one for LUUC members (youth and adults) to support their ongoing training\education (application letters to be submitted that outline reasons for the request). If more than one person is deemed eligible in any year, there will be a "draw" of one applicant at the LUUC AGM to determine the recipient. A recipient can apply more than once but cannot be awarded the bursary two years in a row.
- one to be presented to a graduating high school student of Lakeside Academy. The graduating student recipient of LUUC's "Better World Bursary" to be chosen by the Lakeside Academy staff for outstanding community volunteer actions to "make a better world". A member of LUUC would present the bursary at Lakeside Academy's Graduation and Awards ceremony (usually in the Fall)

When I informed Margaret's brother <u>Ken</u> about our decision, he replied, "Thank you so much for sharing that with me. I am sure Margaret would be pleased that she will be able to influence future generations in this way."

The rest of the month of November found me baking 80 pounds of fruitcake for devotees - and which will add \$668 for the LUUC coffers.....

So, with such a busy and exciting November - I am sure we will have much to look forward to for December and the New Year!

It is the intention of the members of LUUC to apply her generous bequest (\$32,463) in a way that will continue to reflect her values, and her commitment to working for a better world.

In order to do so, the Board of Directors proposes that:

- between the following 2 bursaries
- one for LUUC members (youth and adults) to support their ongoing training\education (application letters to be submitted that outline reasons for the request). If more than one person is deemed eligible in any year, there will be a "draw" of one applicant at the LUUC AGM to the bequest will be held in a special fund (in a GIC in our bank);
- the annual interest from the bequest fund would be used to award two bursaries each year (the amount known each Spring). Beginning Spring 2024, the total interest amount would be divided equally determine the recipient. A recipient can apply more than once but cannot be awarded the bursary two years in a row.

SERIOUS WARNING FROM SHEILA

<u>Sheila Writes</u>: I received this from a friend in Beaconsfield this evening –(they came to her home and one of her neighbours...)

People are reporting a man or two men coming to their doors - in Beaurepaire, Beaconsfield, Pointe-Claire, Pierrefonds - usually in the evening or late afternoon. The stories are the same. These instances have also been reported on Neighbour to Neighbour in Beaconsfield.

The man or men talk vaguely about high energy costs, Hydro, and a 'program', but won't show ID or documents or specify exactly what they want or whom they represent. They say they have just visited the nearby neighbours and go on about a program, but won't say what it is. In two instances they said their names were Gabriel and Angel - scammers with a sense of humour? They tried to get homeowners' names.

They speak French and English. If the homeowner seems hesitant, they ask if they can come back. Some of these visits have been reported to Public Security.

I would add that people should report suspicious visits like this to their local Police station too....

Many people had bought her book in advance, and several others bought one of the copies she had with her. Dr. Maureen and Shahla, the sister of our 3 Afghan siblings, compared memories of that country and its culture, and Maureen responded to our many

questions, as she expressed her respect and compassion for the Afghan people.

Dr. Mayhew did not want payment for her presentation that evening and was delighted that a free-will offering taken that evening raised \$400 to help Shahla's siblings in their uncertain refuge in Pakistan while awaiting sponsorship to Canada needed for her 3 young children as her husband works as an Uber driver from 10 a.m.

MORE ABOUT THE 3 AFGHAN SIBLINGS

Rev. Diane Rollert and her team at the Unitarian Church of Montreal recently submitted the federal sponsorship applications for Laila, Enjila and Dawood after ensuring the 3 sets of required documents were correct and complete for each of the siblings. Once that was confirmed and the forms signed by the siblings and Rev. Diane Rollert as the official sponsor (online now possible), the forms were forwarded quickly to Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada with high hopes - only to have those hopes quickly dashed with this:

*** Automatic Reply / Réponse Automatique ***

"Good day, Thank you for contacting the Resettlement Operations Centre in Ottawa (ROC-O). This automatic reply confirms that your email has been received by our mailbox.

Privately Sponsored Refugee (PSR) applications - Checking your application status and processing times

ROC-O is currently experiencing a high volume of case status queries, which may affect our response times. Our staff are working hard to ensure applications are processed quickly and efficiently. We thank you for your continued patience.

For applications submitted by Groups of Five and Community Sponsors, your application will be created and you will receive an AOR within nine months of submission. Once your application is created in our case management system please allow at least eight (8) months after you receive your Acknowledgement of Receipt (AOR) before requesting any status updates on your application.

We will only answer inquiries beyond the stated time lines here."

So once again, we have to wait (and wait, and wait...) for those critically important case numbers to even be assigned to them!

And of course, we are very worried too. I am sure you have all heard of Afghan refugee seekers being expelled from Pakistan and sent back to Aghanistan and a very uncertain future. This has been taking place in huge numbers, with the Police often coming to buildings in the middle of the night to round up people to expel from the country - no matter what terror awaits them in Afghanistan!

At this time, 2 of the siblings have valid visitor visas for up to March & April 2024 - but one had two applications rejected and so now tries to remain hidden, while in terror of being found.....while we wait, and hope.

POMPEII – peaceful - A flock pf grazing sheep is helping archaeologists to preserve the ancient ruins of Pompeii, the Roman city that was buried under metres of ash in the calamitous eruption of Mount Vesuvius in AD 79. Archaeologists have uncovered around 2/3rd of the 66-hectare site at Pompeii since excavations began 250 years ago. Preserving the unexplored parts of the city against erosion is a priority.
