Daniel Bellegarde is a vibrant and mesmerizing Montrealbased Canadian percussionist of Haitian origin. He has played alongside legendary Quebec artist Robert Charlebois, Haitian singer Émeline Michel, Brazilian artists Bïa and Paulo Ramos, and with the Cirque du Soleil.

He can be heard on over 50 albums as a studio musician. His first solo album, Anba Tonèl was influenced by the West Indian music that cradled his childhood. NOTES FROM THE PRESIDENT



After feeling quite grumpy for weeks about having a Green Christmas, I find myself now, following a couple of weeks of snow and polar temperatures, thinking back on that time with nostalgia as I struggle into boots, coat, hat, mitts and scarf before daring to open the door...

While that cold weather, and seasonal illnesses, caused a few last-minute changes of plans for our Sunday services, it also highlighted the creativity, capacity and commitment of LUUCers to "carry on carrying on".

Nancy Schmidt presented a wonderful service on "Kindred Spirits - Then and Now" on January 7 - prepared in just 3 days after the scheduled speaker was unable to come. In spite of the snowstorm raging outside, the 20 people who came to the church, and 10 others on Zoom found that Nancy's presentation was EXACTLY the best medicine for our post-holiday blues. Nancy told us about her Gazette columns of 1992-94, in which she wrote about many local people whose kindness and generosity were highlighted in her articles. These many years later, it can be a challenge not to sink into despair about the daily reports of violence, hate and war, but Nancy reminded us that we can still find wonderful "kindred spirits" - in our neighbourhoods and communities - if we just take the time to look, and discover them. The Sunday presenters during the rest of January brought us the proof of her words.

On January 14, Robert Green ignited our interest and spirited discussion about Quebec's new curriculum on Culture & Citizenship. The following Sunday, **Nathalie Hainaut** led us in meditation and movement to reduce our anxiety and stress, and demonstrated how we can support one another with compassion. The month end Sunday Cafe was a special musical treat, with Zal Sissokho, a Senegalese-Canadian who draws on the griot tradition of West African storytelling and music.

We are a small congregation, with a lot of dedication and enthusiasm but also with limited skills and energy. The LUUC Board members are grateful to everyone who serves on committees or helps with the many tasks involved for our Sunday services and other activities.

We have also been supported by a wonderful team of seven skilled people; our music director Kerry-Anne Kutz, administrative secretary Selina Rooker-Sanchez, newsletter editor Heather Falconer, media consultant Anik Vigneault, A-V technician Oddbjorn Taraldsvik, book-keeper Darcy Bryant and child and youth Spiritual Exploration coordinator Christina Koulouris. They have helped us to reach out to our larger community, and to welcome more newcomers to our programs and services. Thanks to this strong support team, and the efforts each LUUCer has contributed, we are ON OUR WAY to reaching our goal for growth in 2024 - and that newcomers will find "kindred spirits" at our Lakeshore UU Congregation!





SNOW-MELTING MATS

(Michael & Lynette's Advisory):

It surprises us that more homeowners don't use snow-melting mats – typically, they don't cost too much to install and operate, and they could easily save us from nasty, long-term injuries – please see the pics below in our example (mats are black).

A "pre-mats" day in the life of Michael: The sudden, vicious slip (despite deep-tread boots), had me airborne and rotating, several feet above the concrete, black-ice covered, access steps. I knew I had to land, of course, but how? My RUGBY survival skills kicked in! With instinctive contortions, protecting the vital "noggin", I cushioned some of the fall – and landed in a clattering "thump" – then lay, waiting for pain (not too much, pretty please) to show up, wherever.

PS. Lynette took two painful, "slick-ice, flying" falls as well – but no longer now!



Our (Quite Typical) Equipment (4 years ago now)

- Neoprene mats, each embedded with electrical heating wires in standard shapes and sizes, interconnecting with 15a all-weather cabling and plugs;
- Twin circuits, each with 15a supply cable, with local switching on/off feature;
- Wall mounted, external (twin-circuit box) *;
- Dedicated circuit with 20a on/off switch within heated garage * to breaker box;

NB1. * Denotes up-front work of suitable electrician.

NB2: Remote wireless controls available but not purchased/extra. Ice-melting salts are not longer needed or used on steps – no more damage to concrete and surfacing mortar. Mats and cabling are installed annually, November to April, then stored for summer & fall – not too heavy to handle: a "breeze".

REV. DIANE ROLLERT IS LEAVING THE UNITARIAN CHURCH OF MONTREAL

In a letter dated January 18, Rev. Diane Rollert wrote this bittersweet letter to the members of the Unitarian Church of Montreal:

"Dear UCM Family,

After much reflection, I have come to the decision that I will retire as your minister this June. Eighteen years is a good run, far beyond the length of an average ministry in any denomination these days.

I have found much joy, meaning and purpose in serving the Unitarian Church of Montreal. We have been through a lot and accomplished a lot together. We've grown and adapted in ways that have made me very proud. I've been the luckiest Unitarian Universalist minister in Canada (maybe in the world) to have landed in such a vibrant and caring community.

Over the past few months, I have come to the deepening realization that this is the right moment for me to say goodbye. As a congregation, you are in great shape. You have excellent leadership in place to guide you through this next phase. You have a strong staff that brings dedication and creativity to everything they do. The next minister you call will be very blessed by all you have to offer.

Although I will always be a minister, the Unitarian Church of Montreal was my first, and it will be my last, full-time call as a settled parish minister. I'm 67 (of course, that's not old!), but I'm looking forward to slowing down, focusing more on family, working on a number of projects I have in mind, and travelling.

My goal is to spend the next five months saying goodbye well. I hope that we can spend this time celebrating what we have accomplished together. I've still got a lot I want to preach about, and many songs I still want to sing with you! But as the months go by, many of the decisions you might have turned to me will be yours to make.

The next steps are pretty straightforward. The board will be in contact with the Ministerial Transitions office at the Unitarian Universalist Association, which will assist them in the process of finding an interim minister, hopefully to join you starting in August. Usually, the interim minister says for a year or two while you form a search committee and then search for a permanent settled minister. You, as a congregation, will choose your next minister through a democratic process, all of which will be carefully spelled out to you.

It might have been during the pandemic that I started to sign my newsletter column "with love." That has not been artifice. It has truly come from my heart. I cannot thank you enough for your trust and the privilege of having served as your minister for all these years. I know that change is always hard, but I have faith that you will go from strength to strength.

HOW TIMES HAVE CHANGED

When my husband and I moved to Montreal in 1965, we bought a 12-year-old two-storey house in Pointe Claire for \$14,000 - which was exactly twice my blue-collar husband's annual salary. We were a family of 5 – (with a station wagon, dog and no debts apart from the mortgage), and I was a stay-at-home Mum. That house today is now 70 years old and worth over half a million \$.

I have two 30-something grandchildren, both well-educated, single with good jobs and solid benefits and they want to buy a house. But there is nothing on the housing market for double, triple or even four times their current salaries. What are young people to do in this vast snowy land? Home ownership, which we thought was our birth-right, is out of reach for so many young Canadians.

Below is a chart of expenses – <u>circa 1966</u> - courtesy Chatelaine magazine, which I used as a guide to budgeting - a family of 5 with a <u>monthly</u> take home pay of \$450.00 - **Unbelievable!!!**

Fuel/Utilities	38.00

Transport	28.00	
Health	18.00	

Other categories included, household supplies, savings and extras.

LUUC CONTINUES TO COLLECT NON-PERISHABLE FOOD



Our <u>February 2nd</u> movie **'Antwone Fisher'** features Denzel Washington and Derek Luke. It is a biographical drama based on a true story.

A sailor prone to violent outbursts is sent to a naval psychiatrist for help. Refusing at first to open up, the young man eventually breaks down and reveals a horrific childhood. INDIA – a new temple - In the last few months, the city of Ayodhya transformed into what some Hindu nationalist leaders have dubbed the "Hindu Vatican." Frenzied construction work has resulted in a brand-new airport, an expanded railway station, and several luxury hotel chains that are expected to welcome nearly 50 million religious tourists every year. Some 3,000 homes and shops were bulldozed to widen four major corridors and create an eight-mile-long path

to the temple, which is surrounded by arched sandstone gates and 162 murals depicting Ram's life.



HOLLAND – The Hague - South Africa has taken Israel to the International Court in The Hague on grounds of genocide, as it recognized a similarity between the Palestine situation and its own ordeal under the Apartheid regime. The ICJ did not agree – but suggested that Israel use more caution in its attacks on Palestinian cities and try to avoid civilian causalities. So far there are 26,000 dead, one child killed every 10 minutes, thousands of orphans, 83 journalists and over 136 UNRWA aid workers killed, buildings and cities

uninhabitable, land grabs by settlers and a halt to essential food and medical aid.
