NOTES FROM THE PRESIDENT



February was quite a month!! Valentine's Day plans for many were cancelled by the first blast of 37 cm of snow to hit Montreal.....only to be followed on February 16 by another 37 cm.!

That had many of us remembering back to March 3-4, 1971 when we were hit by the what was then called, the "Storm of the Century". I had just given birth to my daughter Inge on March 1st at the Lakeshore General

Hospital, and was there longer than expected as it took several days before snow clearing could allow people to get into, or out of, the hospital.

After many exchanges of emails and phone call messages, the Board of Directors and the Sunday Services committee decided to fully cancel the Feb. 16 Sunday service - and it was a good thing we did! One week later, Montreal is still struggling to remove huge snowbanks (some of which are hiding buried vehicles....) and to clear sidewalks for those trying to get around by bus or feet.

February brought good news too. Our new Administrative Coordinator, Carole Issekya, breezed through her orientation and training and is now fully ensconced in her LUUC role. She even came to church one Sunday to meet us during coffee hour, and she was very warmly welcomed.

And a reminder of the wonderful gift (bequest) that <u>Margaret Godbeer</u> left us....here is how LUUC members could benefit from that.

The Margaret Godbeer Bursary is for LUUC members (youth and adults) to support their ongoing training/education. Application letters are to be submitted to the LUUC Board that outline the reasons for that request.

The bursary for 2025 is \$800. The deadline for applications is May 31st of each year.

If more than one person is deemed eligible in any year, there will be a "draw" of one applicant at the LUUC Annual Meeting in June to determine the recipient. A recipient can apply more than once, but cannot be awarded the bursary two years in a row.

We look forward to receiving applications for this wonderful bursary!

KERRY-ANNE AND ROB LUTES: SONGS TO CELEBRATE OUR SHARED HERITAGE!


Date: March 23, after the LUUC service

TOWARD NEW HORIZONS – by Clifford Lincoln – chapter 9.



Clifford Lincoln was named Minister of the Environment for Quebec in 1985, and the issue of smoking was in the mandate, as part of control of ambient air.

Bill 84 passed in June 1986, after long and challenging negotiations with municipalities and bus companies.

In his own words, "After its adoption, I realized that if the municipalities failed to adopt enabling by-laws, a significant void would result.

So I obtained the unqualified support of one of the large municipalities in my riding, Pointe Claire, to serve as the municipal catalyst for the law. The mayor of Pointe Claire, Malcolm Knox, was a quiet leader of foresight and wisdom for whom I had deep respect and esteem.

He and his council agreed not only to enact a municipal bylaw, but to train Pointe Claire's firefighters to start an awareness program, and enforce the by-law. Besides, Pointe Claire was the seat of the Lakeshore General Hospital, which had fostered a dynamic district health program, led by Dr. John Osterman and Joanne Gélinas, who was later to become Canada's Sustainable Development Commissioner. They would both become key allies in fostering awareness and implementation of the law.

Pointe Claire and the Lakeshore General Hospital became pivotal catalysts and examples and other municipalities would gradually follow their programs."



People came up after the service to add to the amount collected under the regular collection. \$95.00 was collected with 'no overhead costs'! It was very rewarding for people to offer support to a group whose work they had just heard about. The Pound Paws model of operation seems exemplary. The person receiving the money is directly involved in the day-to-day functioning – no middleman 'from elsewhere'. They seem to be highly effective at using almost exclusively local volunteers, giving up their time to give animals another chance at finding a happy home. Perhaps a similar model can be used to loosely organize willing volunteers to spend time, now and then, to just hang out with human beings who would benefit from ordinary socializing in a safe place.
